

# **FEATURE SHOW**

Feature Show is one of the most popular methods when responding 2NT (14+) after your partner has opened a Weak Two. For many years, Ogust [named after Harold Ogust (1916-1977)] was the standard method for finding out if your partner was minimum 6-8 or maximum 9-10 with a Weak Two opening. However. Feature Show has replaced Ogust, and in many ways is much simpler and more descriptive.


#### WHAT DO YOU NEED TO BID 2NT:


At least 14HCP or 13HCP with a singleton and 3+ of partner's suit.

With 14HCP you may be in game if the opener is maximum With 16HCP and a fit you definitely should be in game 18/19+ CHECK OUT SLAM

OPENER'S REPLIES after a weak two opening & 2NT showing 14+


- Repeating their suit at the 3 level shows minimum points 6-8 and 5 tricks
- Bidding another suit shows a King or Ace in that suit and 9-10 HCP. In other words, what you are showing is a "feature" which also indicates maximum points.
- Bidding 3NT shows maximum and AKQ or AKJ in opener's suit. It denies an Ace or King in a side suit.

#### Jacoby Transfers after partner opens 1NT

Jacoby Transfers are used after your partner has opened or overcalled a natural 1NT and ensures the strong hand plays the contract thus limiting the amount of information the defenders have about where the high cards are located. A transfer always promises a 5-card or longer holding in the suit opener has been asked to transfer to.

The following responses after partner opens 1NT are very simplistic and easy to learn:

Kesponse	Meaning
2.	Transfer to Hearts (responder is promising 5 Hearts)
2 💙	Transfer to Spades (responder is promising 5 Spades)

Transfer to Clubs – only used when you have a 6-card or longer club or diamond suit; less than 5/6 HCP and you have no outside entries for partner to get into your hand. It is a weak take-out. If your suit is clubs you will pass, if your suit is diamonds you will now bid  $3 \spadesuit$  and opener must pass. This is called a puppet bid because it may mean clubs or diamonds – in other words you pass or correct.

# THE MOST IMPORTANT PART OF TRANSFERS IS THE REBID BY RESPONDER AFTER HIS PARTNER COMPLETES THE TRANSFER.

- If he passes, responder has less than 7HCP and weak hand.
- If he rebids 2NT responder is showing 8/9 HCP
- If he rebids 3NT responder is showing 10+ HCP and a five card suit in the major.
- If he rebids 4H or 4S he is showing 10 TOTAL points and a 6-card major
- If he rebids the other major. Partner is showing two 5-card majors

Oswald "Ozzie", "Jake" Jacoby (December 8, 1902 – June 27, 1984) was an American contract bridge player and author, considered one of the greatest bridge players of all time and a key innovator in the game, having helped popularize widely used bidding conventions such as Jacoby transfers and the Jacoby 2NT.,

# The Difference Between A Faced Opening Lead Out of Turn & a Lead Out of Turn

One of the most common infractions that bridge players inadvertently make is thinking they are on lead or have won the trick and subsequently lead out of turn. With the opening lead, provided the card is face down – there is no penalty, the card is returned to the hand and the correct player leads. However, if it is a faced opening lead or a lead during play out of turn, both infractions require the Director being called to the table as slightly different rules apply.

#### Law 54 Faced Opening Lead out of turn:

- Declarer has the option of accepting the lead and dummy must be faced before he plays or he can opt for his partner to be declarer and he will become dummy by spreading his hand.
- Declarer has the option of not accepting the opening lead out of turn, in which case, the lead card led becomes a major penalty card where law 50D applies.
- Law 50D: Declarer can require the offender's partner to lead the suit of the penalty card or prohibit him from leading that suit for as long as he retains the lead. In both cases, defender returns the card to his hand. Or...Declarer can say lead anything and the penalty card remains on the table and must be played at the earliest opportunity either leading, following suit, trumping or discarding.

# Law 55 Declarer's Lead out of turn during play:

- If Declarer has led from his or dummy's hand when it was a defender's turn to lead, and has been asked to retract the lead, declarer restores the card to the hand it came from and no further rectification applies.
- If Declarer has led from the wrong hand, if asked to retract the lead by the opposition, he withdraws the card and leads from the correct hand.

# Law 56 Defender's Lead out of turn during play:

- When a lead out of turn by a defender is faced, declarer may accept the irregular lead and play continues.
- Or require the defender to retract his faced lead out of turn and the withdrawn card becomes a major penalty card and Law 50D (see above) then applies.

# **Andy Hung's Workshop**



Andy Hung conducted his workshops on Tuesday 17 July. We had 9 tables in the morning and afternoon sessions. Everyone who attended was very pleased with his lesson.

In the morning, he presented 6 valuable tips for better bridge bidding and play. His explanations were very clear and logical. He provided boards to practise the lesson.

In the afternoon he conducted a lesson on 4th Suit forcing. The lesson was easy to follow and implement with his practice boards.

We will invite Andy back next year to conduct lessons on other topics.

# **Building Maintenance Report**



We had a light fitting in the toilet alcove playing up a couple of weeks ago. After trying 3 electrical lighting firms in Toowoomba, it had become very obvious that these lights (5 in all) were so old that the "B" shaped fluoro tubes are no longer available in Australia.

So we bit the bullet, and replaced all 5 similar lights with dual voltage LED lights, set to the lower 16W setting to mitigate

against excessive glare. They are installed in the male, female, and handicapped person toilets, the alcove outside the toilets, and outside the dealing room.

The exhaust fan in the ladies toilet has become noisy, and the bearings were doused in WD40 by our electrician, while doing the light changeover. Still noisy, so expect that it will be replaced during July.

Some may have noticed some noise coming from the air con system adjacent the western wall of the western playing room. Turns out that one filter in particular was so clogged with lint that air could not get through the filter. It was being sucked at high velocity past the almost non-existent gap around the edge of the filter. The 3 monthly filter clean in late May fixed that one.

Something to keep an eye (or is that ear) on toward each 3-month maintenance cycle.

For those who look skyward for inspiration during competition, you will have noticed some of the ceiling tiles have become stained from water leaks. We have some tile material in the storage shed that can be cut to size to replace about 6 to 8 of the worst. I expect that we will need to try a couple of local businesses to obtain more matching (if possible) ceiling tiles to replace all of the stained ones. I plan to get that organised in the next couple of weeks.

# **Beginner Lessons and Praxis**



Last week all the Wednesday morning beginners graduated into the Wednesday morning Restricted Pairs session. It pushed our table numbers up from 6 to 11 (c) (see picture below). Dave, Trudy and I (the fat boy in the photo) were on hand to provide help if the new players requested it. This session starts at 8:45 with a short-ish talk – sometimes about a recent hand we all played, and sometimes as a refresher on what has been learned in lessons. We then play 24 boards.

Later in the year, Glenys will be approaching our new members to prepare player profiles, so you will get to know a bit about them. It is easier to strike up a conversation with a bit of background knowledge.

# **Masterpoint Secretary's Report**

In May, I processed results for 42 sections from 32 sessions yielding 103.38 green and 85.44 red masterpoints. In June, I processed results for 39 sections from 29 sessions yielding 136.65 green masterpoints. There are a further 7.64 red masterpoints from the Winter Woolly Pairs that will be processed in July (an incorrect Master Factor had been used on the day, and thus these masterpoints had to be recalculated).

#### How often do we play?

In terms of player frequency, 242 members played at least once in June, 123 people played more than 4 times (eg average at least one a week) and 36 people played more than 10 times. The top four all played 17 times in the month (including me).

We could also take the mathematician or statistician approach and note we had 340 tables x 4 people per table / 307 members = 4.42 sessions per member. In other words, an average of just over once per week. Like all statistics, this can be misinterpreted. It includes the 65 members who did not play in June, it includes a few visitors, and it is extremely rare to only play 0.42 of a session!

#### Who's who, and what's what?

Here is an overview of the percentage of members that are in some common masterpoint ranges:

It is interesting to note that we (Toowoomba) have a lower proportion of newer (0-20) players compared to the two Brisbane clubs in the table and compared to the national scene. I feel that we don't keep as many players as we could (eg they move away or stop playing bridge) but the data shows otherwise. It seems we do have a good retention rate as indicated by the percentage of players within the 20-300 band.

These data also show that 67% of our members are at Novice ranking (fewer than 100 masterpoints) and are eligible to play in our novice congresses. A further 25% can play in our Under 500 congresses, and 9% are excluded from such events.

The 33% of members with more than 100 masterpoints make up over 55% of the bridge played – because they tend to be the ones who play more than once a week

# **Winners are Grinners**

The "Monthly Winners" are recognised as the "individual" winner of <u>eclectic</u> multisession events. These events combine of all the green masterpoint sessions in a month that have not already counted toward a competition.

If there are three available sessions then your best two scores are counted (shows as 2/3). If there are four available sessions then your best three scores are counted (3/4) and if there are five available sessions then your best four scores might be counted (4/5).

If there are two available sessions, then they are treated as an eclectic event (best 2/2). If there are five days in the month, then we usually combine two of these (see the bridge diary) as a "<u>Two-Weekly</u>" and additional masterpoints are awarded to the top half of those whose partnerships played both days. The remaining three days are scored as an eclectic with (2/3).
