Session Overview

The following is an overview of the current playing sessions at the Toowoomba Bridge Club:

Monday Afternoon : 12:30 – 4:30 **Graded Duplicate**

A "loosely graded" session with approximately 11-14 tables in the Open section in the West room and 9-10 tables in the Restricted section in the East room for newer players. The division between grades will be at the Directors discretion to make the number of tables similar. Typical cut-off is around 50.

Tuesday Daytime : 10:30 – 2:30 **Duplicate**

Single session duplicate pairs with 7-8 tables – bring your own lunch.

Tuesday Night : 7:00 – 10:15 **Duplicate**

Small single session duplicate pairs with 4-5 tables. Occasional teams and Individual events.

Wednesday Morning : 9:00 – 12:00 Supervised Play

The object of Supervised Play is to give members the opportunity to play in an environment of players at the same level as themselves. Each week Ian Jesser discusses a bridge topic before play. This session is limited to players with less than 20 masterpoints or a combined partnership. Typically, 8-9 tables.

Wednesday Afternoon : 12:30 – 4:30 Graded Duplicate

A "loosely graded" session with approximately 11 tables in the Open section in the West room and 11 tables in the Restricted section in the East room for newer players. The division between grades will be at the Directors discretion to make the number of tables similar. Typical cut-off is around 100.

Thursday Night : 7:00-10:00 Duplicate

A short gentle duplicate pairs session with around 9-11 tables playing 24-27 boards.

Friday Morning : 8:30 for talk and 9:00 - 12:00Duplicate

A short gentle duplicate pairs session with around 8-10 tables playing 24 boards. Short lesson to suit advanced beginners starts at 8:30.

Friday Afternoon : 12:30 – 4:30 Duplicate

Single section duplicate pairs with 7-9 tables.

Saturday Afternoon : 12:30 – 4:30 Duplicate

Single section duplicate pairs – this is a small session so please check with the Director or the club website the day before to see if it is running.

Session Rules Reminder

- Players should be <u>seated</u> 10 minutes prior to the start of play for a session.
- The Director makes the final decision on seating arrangements and on playing arrangements in the room (e.g. windows, air-conditioning).
- Only green and blue systems are permitted in club events.
- System cards are compulsory for competitions and red master point events and strongly recommended for all other sessions.
- NS are primarily responsible for the playing conditions at the table (bridgemates, management of boards and moving them if instructed to do so by the Director).
- EW are primarily responsible for tidy up and leaving the table in a good condition ready for the next session.
- All players should offer to help with general room clean-up to assist the Director.
- No notices are permitted on the noticeboards unless approval is given from the Management Committee.
- No trading is permitted on the club premises unless written permission is given via the Management Committee.
- Smoking is only permitted in the Designated Smoking Area or in the parklands off the premises.

Masterpoint Secretary's Report

Total masterpoints earned in the club over the past few months were:



A total of 1711.91 green points were earned by players in our club in the ABF census period of 1^{st} Oct 2017 – 30^{th} Sept 2018, which entitles us to 32 red masterpoint sessions in 2019.

Members are reminded that the number of masterpoints you earn is based on the total number of tables in your section, the status of the event (supervised, club, red points, gold points and congresses) and your position in the top half of the field. Some of the red and gold point calculations can be complex, so masterpoints displayed on our noticeboards or website are provisional until approved at the end of each month.

If you feel that you are missing some masterpoints, check with the Club Masterpoint Secretary in the first instance, advising of the date and session that you played in, who your partner was and who the Director was. If you think you are missing points from an event, then tell me the event name and date. If you added up the points you think you might receive, and the actual amount is different, then tell me the points/events you think you did achieve. Remember that I only process club masterpoints. Those from congresses, nationwide pairs and other events are done by other people, usually months later.

For those who like data, the following graph shows the total number of tables that played in each month from July 2007 (when we moved into this building) and now.



The best way to ensure our long-term viability is to encourage new people to learn bridge and then encourage them to stay and play. The South Australian Bridge Association has shown some impressive growth over the last five years, and it is interesting to see they have performance targets for number of tables and number of members.

In the Zone

Queensland Open Pairs


Three pairs qualified through the Zone event to play in the State Final of the Queensland Open Pairs, hosted by Northern Suburbs Bridge Club on 13th-14th October: Henry Eastment & Ian Jesser Chris Snook & Denise Hartwig John Churchett & Eileen Josey It is satisfying to do well against some of the state's strongest pairs, even if only for a few rounds. It's a bit of a long event with 41 x 3-board rounds over the two days, so we can be excused for getting a bit tired towards the end. All three of our local pairs did well at times, and congratulations to Henry and Ian for placing 10th overall. The winners of the QBA Open Pairs for 2019 were brother and sister, Richard Ward and Lindy Vincent, who often play in our three-day congress.

Grand National Open Teams

The GNOT Final was held at Tweed Heads at the end of November, with local team Chris Snook, Denise Hartwig, Eileen Josey and John Churchett representing the Darling Downs Zone.

The final was comprised of 64 teams from around Australia. It is a knockout event, although the immediate losers then play in a repechage competition of 9 x 12-board rounds. The top two at the end of the repechage re-enter the main event at the semi-final stage (but not us). Even so, it is always pleasing to pick up a few wins in such esteemed company, but like Oliver Twist – I always want more!

Here is an interesting board from our first match.




As North, I was presented with an ideal hand to use the "Kim's Gadget" that we have been talking about at the Friday Morning Improvers Group.

An opening bid of 4C shows precisely 6 Spades and 5 Hearts and 8-12 HCP. There was certainly variety around the room, with some people passing, some opening 1S, some opening 1S and jumping to 4H, some opened a multi-two Heart (Hearts and another).

I like the 4C opening as it absolutely locks East out of interfering. Denise and I have done well using this bid so far, with an average of about 80%, a worst bidding score of 50% and our worst score on one board was 25% because I mis-played the hand. It seems to turn up once a month so it worth adding to the system, because most people won't use 4C or 4D for anything else.

Only 9 of the 64 pairs got to 6 Hearts making 12 or 13, including Denise who had rather a quick auction to get there. Talk with your partner about how your system would fare.

It is not always the excitement of Slam, the system works just as well with game contracts. Here is one where I got to play in 4H by North making 11 (losing the unavoidable AC and AS).



Every board counts in bridge, but some hands are more fun to talk about than others.

Director Training

Get it right - Bridgemates

It is very important that players enter information correctly into the Bridgemate table-top scoring units, and that the opponents at the table check the information when it is entered. That is the time to make corrections.

Entering Names

Most players will be familiar with this process. Press [Ok] to wake up the Bridgemate, enter the section number and table number, and then for club sessions you will be asked to enter the "player numbers" (these are your club numbers). Type each number, and when you are sure they are correct press [Ok] to move to the next one.




When all four numbers have been entered the Bridgemate will lookup the names and display these to you.

Get East or West to check at this point. If a name is incorrect, press [Cancel] and input the number again. If all correct, then press [Ok].

Still Fixing Names

Despite the above, some players may accidently go past this screen or may not bother checking!! During a round, players can still review the player names that are currently registered in the Bridgemate system. Pressing the NAMES function key displays the names of the four players expected to be at the table.




If one of these names is incorrect, press [Correc] and go back and change the number to what it should be.


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Entering Scores


Most of us should be OK with entering scores. Wake up the Bridgemate by pressing [Ok], enter the board number, contract, lead and result. I often enter the board number contract and lead, and then only have to enter the result after the hand is played. This way I do not have to remember all of this extra information.



After you enter the result (number of tricks) the Bridgemate will calculate the results and briefly show North to give you time to check.



Then after a few seconds the display will change to show the result verification screen, so you should give the Bridgemate to East or West for them to check and press [Accept]. If there is a problem press [Cancel] and correct the offending information.




Time to Check Scores

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There is still an opportunity for players to check a scored during a round (perhaps a Bridgemate timed out or an opponent pressed [Accept] too quick). To do this press the [Scores] function key.



This will let you see all your other scores during the current round. If any of these are wrong, press [Correc] and enter the board number that needs changing (deleting).



Please remember that it is your responsibility to enter the names and scores correctly. It is unfair to expect Directors to fix scores after the event – they will often drive back in to correct a score! It is also unfair on other players to see scores changing after they have seen results on display on the noticeboards.

Common Bridgemate entry errors include:

- Putting in a different partners number by mistake [but surely you know the name of the person sitting opposite you].
- Only typing two out of the three-digit player number [again, a different name will appear].
- Putting in a result with the wrong compass direction (more common with a Howell movement, but surprisingly this still happens with a Mitchell).
- Bidding 4S and making, but then entering 4 tricks instead of 10.
- Pressing keys too quickly. They rely much more on contact time rather than pressure!!!
- Not actually agreeing to the number of tricks before entering data.
- Missing the double or redouble in a contract.

Attention to detail and reading before pressing [Ok] or [Accept] will avoid all the above problems.

Please follow correct procedure and check.

Exclusion Blackwood

Exclusion Blackwood is a refinement of Roman Key Card Blackwood that allows you to ask for hand.

Instead on using 4NT as the inquiry bid, you jump to the five-level in in the suit where you hold the void. In the auction 1S - 3S - 5D, for example, the opener's 5D bid would be asking for key cards in Spades excluding the diamond ace (a card of little value opposite a void).

Changes to Club By-laws

Changes to Club By-Laws

The following By-laws were introduced by the Management Committee at its meeting on 17th October 2018 after several weeks of discussion and will be available on the Club's home Page soon.

The original By-law 6.2 was amended to remove the requirement that Visitors were not permitted to play at the club after they had played as visitors three times unless they became members. The

Table fee for Visitors was raised to \$8 to encourage players from our Zone to become members, rather than play as visitors many times. It is worth noting that the additional \$3 paid by visitors is comparable with that of some other clubs.

The club has never had a by-law describing the process whereby a member may become an Honorary Life Member and **By-law 8.4** was introduced to fill this gap.

By-Law 6.2

6.2 Table Fees and Entry Fees

6.2.1 Table Fees in all Club events shall be at a rate determined and promulgated by the Management Committee. As from 1 January 2019 these rates are:
\$5.00 per member per session
\$8.00 per visitor per session
A visitor is a person who is not a member of the Toowoomba Bridge Club but is a member of another bridge club.
Visitors may play any number of times, but visitors from clubs within our Zone will be encouraged to join the Club.

6.2.2 Table fees for other events held at the Club may include an additional entry fee.

By-Law 8.4 – HONORARY LIFE MEMBERSHIP

8.4 Honorary Life Membership

8.4.1 Honorary Life members are defined in Rule 6 Classes of members as "being persons whom the association at a general meeting may, for outstanding service to the association, think fit to admit to honorary life membership".

8.4.2 Procedure for admission to Honorary Life Membership

 Nominations for Honorary Life Membership shall be submitted in writing to a meeting of the Management Committee, not less than eight weeks prior to the scheduled date of the next Annual General Meeting. The nominee shall be proposed and seconded by two financial members of the Club. The nomination shall be signed by the Nominee, Proposer and the Seconder. The nomination shall also include a brief profile of the Nominee to provide grounds for the nomination.


- (ii) The Management Committee shall decide by majority vote if the nomination meets the key criteria, and if so will pass the nomination onto the next Annual General Meeting. The Secretary shall forthwith notify the Proposer in writing of the acceptance or rejection of the nomination.
- (iii) The Proposer shall prepare a full testimonial of the Nominee and their achievements to be presented at the Annual General Meeting to support the nomination.
- (iv) Voting on the proposal for Honorary Life Membership shall be by the members present at the Annual General Meeting and the Nominee shall be elected to Life Membership if a majority of the votes cast are in favour of the proposal.
- 8.4.3 Criteria for Honorary Life Membership The criteria for an Honorary Life Membership are:
- Membership are:
 - 1. The nominee must have been a member of the Association for not less than 10 years.
 - 2. The nominee must have performed significant meritorious service for the Association for at least five years in three or more of the following areas:
 - (a) As an executive or ordinary member of the Management Committee;

(b) As a teacher for the Association;

- (c) In areas outside the committee over and beyond that expected of a normal member;
- (d) As a Director;
- (e) As a good ambassador for the Association;
- (f) Other service as may be deemed appropriate by the Management Committee.

8.4.4 Benefits of Honorary Life Membership Honorary Life Members will have the following benefits.

- They will be exempt from payment of the Annual Membership Fee and the club will pay their annual ABF and QBA Levies, and
- (ii) Their names will be displayed on the Honorary Life Members Board in the club rooms and they will be recorded in the Diary as being Honorary Life Members.

George Rosenkranz, who turned 100 last month, is the International Bridge Press Association's personality of the year. Born in Hungary, he completed his doctorate in chemistry in Switzerland before fleeing Europe to escape the Nazis. He ended up in Havana when the Japanese attacked Pearl Harbor. While there he met Edith, his wife of more than 70 years. In 1945 he joined the Syntex Corporation in Mexico City to pursue his research into steroids. He built a team of world class biochemists whose research resulted in the contraceptive birth pill, prednisone, cortisone, and many other steroids. During the 1940s and 50s, Rosenkranz was the author or co-author of more than 300 articles on steroid chemistry and he is named on more than 150 patents.

At bridge he has won 12 North American national titles. He has also written or co-written more than 10 books on bridge, in which he made significant contributions to bidding theory.

The Rosenkranzes hit the headlines in 1984 at the Summer Nationals in Washington, DC when Edith was kidnapped. The ransom of \$US1 million dollars was paid, but as soon as Edith was released, the police swooped in and captured the miscreant, who turned out to be a bridge player from Texas. Unfazed, Edith returned to the bridge table!
