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Within our bridge club, the majority of members are elderly. With age, sadly, comes sensitivity to various things which may affect health and well-





Newer Players

Standard American with 5-card Majors, 15-17 NT, Simple Stayman, Better Minor, Limit Raises, Benjamin Two's, Weak Jump Overcalls, Take-Out Doubles to 3 Diamonds,

Blackwood and Gerber, and Low Encourage.

If you are kind enough to play with a less experienced player, then you **must** play their system. **Please do not start teaching them your way and your system.**

Beyond Beginners

Wednesday morning supervised group is held by Ian Jesser and is limited to 20MP each or 40 MP per pair. It is still continuing to get good attendance, averaging around 8 - 9 tables each session. Culbertson Deal

The great bridge pioneer Ely Culbertson used this hand as a test for his pupils in the 1940s. Seventy years on, see if you can make 5C against the SQ lead. East opened so most of the outstanding points including the major aces will be with him. Given that, the one chance is for 3:3 diamonds but West must be kept off lead or a heart switch will be fatal. Cover SQ with SK but don't ruff. Pitch D7. Now win the return, cash DA, use dummy's C8 and C9 as entries for two. diamond ruffs - the suit breaks - and now CQ lets you back in to cash the needed two diamond winners pitching hearts from hand and your 5C comes home.

Thanks to Eileen who worked it out in under 5 seconds.

New Laws from 1st August

Duplicate bridge started in 1925 when Harold Vanderbilt modified the existing game of auction bridge to allow fairer comparisons and developed a new scoring system (very similar to what we use now). The first Laws of Duplicate Bridge were subsequently published in 1928. As a new game, there have been many modifications to the rules since those early days. In 1987, the World Bridge Federation decide to review the rules every 10 years. So here we are in 2017, the new Laws of Duplicate Bridge have been published and they apply in Queensland, and in our club from Tuesday 1st August.

Firstly (taken from Eamon Galligans blog <u>http://eamongall.blogspot.com.au/</u>) ...

It seems there are to be some new bridge laws starting in Sept 2017.

1. No more tray signalling for opening leads.

2. No more coughing to indicate splinters

3. The wiping of fake sweat from the brow to show ACE is now defunct.

4. Rubbing the chin is no longer allowed for showing the KING.

5. You can no longer indicate possession of the QUEEN by the belly rub.

6. Scratching of the lower regions to indicate JACK is now disallowed.

7. The thumb tap to indicate a singleton HONOR is now defunct.

8. Horizontal leads to indicate top of nothing is no longer allowed.

9. Vertical leads to indicate strength are now disallowed.

10. 4th hand raising a card to indicate power over dummy is no longer a legitimate signal.

Now, seriously, what does everyone need to know?

This is best answered by quoting a section from the 2017 Laws – and I have taken the liberty to embolden some words for emphasis.

"The trends begun in the 2007 Revision have been continued – the **increased discretion** given to Tournament Directors, the attempts to **rectify a situation rather than to penalise**, and maintaining the position of the Regulating Authorities."

The biggest change is a new "Law 23 – Comparable Call". If you make a call that you are not allowed to make (eg an insufficient bid, or a call when it is not your turn), then as always, the player on your left has the option to accept the call, and then the auction proceeds with no further rectification.

If your illegal call is not accepted, then it must be **withdrawn** and we all know that information has passed to partner that they were not entitled to. The old laws were a bit strict and often when it became your real turn to call, you would have to guess the best action because your partner had restrictions on what they could choose because of the unauthorised information, and in many cases were forced to pass for the remainder of the auction.

The new laws try to "*rectify a situation rather than to penalise*" and so emerged Law 23 – Comparable Call.

A call that replaces a withdraw call is a comparable call, if it:

- 1. Has the same or similar meaning as that attributable to the withdrawn call, or
- 2. Defines a subset of the possible meanings attributable to the withdrawn call, or
- *3.* Has the same purpose (eg an asking bid or a relay) as that attributable to the withdrawn call.

Example 1 :

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I open 2H showing 6-10HCP and 6+ Hearts, but it is not my turn. My call is not accepted so it is withdrawn. My right hand opponent opens 1D. In my system a jump overcall of 2H shows 6-10HCP and 6+ Hearts. It meets criterion 1, so I can call 2H and there is no restriction on my partner, If I decide to pass or bid something else then my partner must pass on their next turn to call.

Example 2 :

I pass but it is not my turn, it is my partners. My pass is not accepted. The first call goes to my partner who opens 1H (5+ Hearts and 12-20 HCP). Righty passes. The information attributable to my withdrawn call was 0-10HCP and a hand not suitable to a weak 2 opening. A bid of 2H will show 5-9HCP (a subset of the withdrawn 0-10) so satisfies criterion 2 so will be allowed with no restriction on partner. As you can see, there is more chance to have a normal auction.

Example 3 :

We're having a jolly good auction and partner has bid 4H and I think the baby slam is possible provided we don't lose more than one quick trick, so I ask for Aces by bidding 4C (after Gerber we use CRO responses, not that it is relevant here). My 4C bid is insufficient and is not accepted, so must be withdrawn and I must pass or make a legal bid. The purpose attributable to my 4C bid was to ask for Aces. If in my system 4NT is Blackwood and asks for Aces then 4NT is a comparable call (criterion 3) and I may make it and there is no further restriction on partner. (Note: if 4NT is Roman Keycard Blackwood then it is not a comparable call, and if I am silly enough to call it anyway, then partner must pass for the rest of the auction).

In all cases, if you are allowed a comparable call, and end up in a contract and score that you would not have reached with a legal auction – then the Director will award an adjusted score to take away the advantage.

What's new for the Director?

The introduction of Law 23 and the general principles of the laws places greater pressure on the Playing Director who will often have to take a player away from the table to find out exactly what has occurred and what their system. So please be patient and understanding.

What's new for the Players?

If you follow correct procedure (eg follow suit, play at the correct time, make legal calls in your bidding) then not much has changed for the players. Here are a few things that have:

Law 7A Placement of Board

When a board is to be played it is placed in the **centre of the table** where it shall remain, **correctly oriented**, until play is completed.

Law 11A Action by Non-Offending Side

The right to rectification of an irregularity may be **forfeited** if either member of the **non-offending side takes any action** before summoning the Director.

Law 20F4(a) Explanation of Calls If a player **realizes** during the auction that his **own** explanation was erroneous or incomplete, he must summon the Director before the end of the Clarification Period and correct the misexplanation. He may elect to call the Director sooner, but he is under no obligation to do so. (For a correction during the play period, see Law 75B2.)

Etiquette

BRIDGE ETIQUETTE GUIDELINES

. All bridge players, but especially more experienced players, should provide an example of good bridge etiquette for others to emulate.

2. The display of good bridge etiquette will make you a popular player. Conversely, bad bridge manners result in an atmosphere of hostility.

3. Here are some useful guidelines on bridge etiquette:

- Be courteous to partner and opponents at all times
- Avoid remarks and actions that might annoy or embarrass another player
- A call for the director should be made, when necessary, in a manner that is courteous to the other players and the director
- Don't take offence at inadvertent or ignorant breaches of etiquette by other players, especially inexperienced ones
- Maintain a pleasant demeanour
- Refrain from excessive talking during the hand or between the boards of a round
- Be a good sport compliment your partner or the opponents when it is deserved
- Avoid gloating after a good result
- Avoid griping after a bad result
- Abide by the director's decision with graciousness

Joan Butts is the Australian Bridge Federation's National Teaching Coordinator. I recently read an article she featured

recently about managing entries and ensuring that you are able to get to the entries to be able to take all of your tricks.

An entry isn't just about one card, but two: a *link* card and the entry itself. Entries become vital on the following hand which she played in a tournament:

<u>*TIP*</u>: You can make 10 tricks via four spades, five hearts and the \blacklozenge A. You will need to consider the opponents bidding and the lead. Entries are vital and it is the Trump suit that provides them.

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ANSWER to managing your entries



We need to determine the exact shape of the West hand to work out whether the spades are going to break nice and even or whether the spade lead is a singleton.

Win the $\blacklozenge Q$ in dummy then draw a round of trumps by playing the $\lor 2$ to the $\blacklozenge Q$. A trump back to the $\blacktriangledown K$ sees West follow twice. We now know that West holds 1 spade 2 hearts and 5 diamonds and 5 clubs. East therefore was dealt four spades and West does not hold any more trumps to be able to trump the spades.

To prevent East from getting a spade trick with their \bigstar J1032, we need to finesse twice.

After winning with the $\mathbf{\Psi}$ K, play a small spade from North hand (East will normally play \mathbf{A} J) and win with \mathbf{A} A. Now we need another entry to North's hand to repeat the spade finesse. Luckily we have kept another entry there...the $\mathbf{\Psi}$ A. After winning the trick with the $\mathbf{\Psi}$ A, play a low spade toward the \mathbf{A} K7, and whatever East plays, you cover it...East can't win a spade trick!

The entries to the North hand were the trump suit in the $\mathbf{\Psi}A$ and $\mathbf{\Psi}K$. To retain these two entries, it was essential that a small heart be played first from the North hand to the $\mathbf{\Psi}Q$.
